Students encouraged to practice discounts, sale prices

Pre-Algebra has welcomed our student teacher, Mr. Sam Rose, from Concordia University. He will be here until March, then he will move to his next student teaching assignment in St. Louis. He is covering lessons with percents, decimals, sales, tax, percent increase/decrease, discount, sale prices, markups, retail prices, and wholesale prices. These lessons are very applicable in daily life. We talk about common sense answers and figure approximately what the answer looks like so they have an idea of what type of answer they should get.

I encourage you and your child to figure discounts and sale prices when you go shopping. Do some random easy figuring like 10% off of \$50 is \$5 off the price. Let them figure what they should be paying. It is good common sense math that we hope they will use the rest of their lives.

Algebra 8 is currently factoring polynomials. It is a guess/check type of problems, but what I tell the students is they CAN check every single problem. They could have a 100% on their homework, and test if they go the extra step to check their answers. This can be done many times in math, not just with factoring. I show my students how to check, and some do take the extra time to do so. I encourage you to look over your child's homework, look to see what they are doing and if they are taking the time to check their answers.

Students study earth interior, weather, astronomy

Middle School Science has been very productive. Sixth grade has moved on to Earth Science learning about the Earth's interior. They created 3D models to represent the layers of the Earth. These were really impressive. Some were on display at the Tri-Councils. Then we learned about the supercontinent, Pangea. They read about continental drift, sea-floor spreading and plate tectonics. Their next project will have them using spaghetti noodles and marshmallows to create a structure that they think can withstand an earthquake. Volcanoes will be next on our agenda.

Seventh grade continues to learn about weather.



They have learned to make weather station models that illustrate the temperature, wind speed and direction, cloud cover, dew point and air pressure. They will research different storms and make power point presentations to communicate facts and safety rules for each storm type. They will then be moving on to Newton's Laws of Motion and calculating acceleration.

Eighth graders finished up the biology unit with a dissection of a fish. They are now learning astronomy, such as planets, moon phases, and star constellations. They created paper versions of the planets that were to scale of each other. They also did a project on adding machine paper that puts into perspective the distance between the planets. The students will be watching the moon for a couple of weeks to be able to watch all the phases of the moon. They did stations in which they encountered the HR Diagram showing the brightness and temperature of stars.

Opportunities for STEM Abound

In the summer of 2018, teachers from both St. Mary's and Aquinas met for several days and aligned their science curriculum Pre-K through 12th grade. This was a wonderful opportunity to look for more opportunities to provide engaging opportunities for students to learn and practice science exploration. We were also able to take advantage of textbook loan funds to purchase some new hands-on units that have provided additional experiments and investigations. We are growing red worms and butterflies, creating land forms and exploding volcanos, and testing properties of physics; from Pre-K through fifth grade.

We also added robotics summer camps and a competitive robotics program. About 1/3 of our 3rd-5th graders have jumped in to join these teams. An additional ADM grant will further expand our robotics equipment down to preschool as well as providing additional equipment for the existing teams and expanding up through middle school. We are looking ahead to more of our students developing a real passion for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics!



Making the Final Decision

If you've received award letters from more than one college, congratulations! Your hard work has paid off, and now you get to choose which college is best for you.

Don't worry about choosing that one perfect college — there's no such thing! The bottom line is that college is what you make of it: What you do while you're there matters more than the college name on your diploma. Here's how to make your decision.

You don't have to decide overnight but don't miss the reply deadline.

Get More Information

You already have a lot of information about each college, but digging a little deeper can help you make the best choice for you.

Ask questions.

Create a list of any questions you still have about the colleges you're considering. You may want to get answers to questions like these:

How many students return after freshman year? How many graduate?

Does the college offer the major I'm interested in? What can I do for fun?

What kinds of students feel at home at this college?

Get answers.

The best place to get an answer depends on the question. Ask people who work at the college or even

Current students.

As you search for answers, it's important to use only trustworthy sources of information and to recognize the difference between fact and opinion. A college's official website and its admission officers are often the best sources of factual information about that college.

Visit — or revisit — the campuses.

If possible, check out a college's campus to get more information. If you can't visit a campus, call or email the admission office with your questions. Ask if someone there can put you in touch with current students and recent graduates. Your high school counselor and teachers also may know students who graduated from your high school and now attend the college.

Think things over.

You've done research and asked questions. Now it's time to check your own thoughts and feelings. Ask yourself questions like these:

How did I feel when I was on campus at each college?

Which colleges best match my list of must-haves? Where can I imagine myself as successful and happy?

Compare the colleges.

Use your new information to sort the colleges by what they offer and what you want. Make a list of the pros and cons for each college.

Compare Financial Aid Awards

Your decision should not be solely on cost, however it should certainly be considered.

Make Your Decision

You don't have to decide overnight. Many colleges don't expect your final decision until May 1, so you have some time to make up your mind. But remember that colleges are serious about reply deadlines. If you don't send your deposit in time, you risk losing your place.

Student Aid Explained The SAR (Student Aid Report)

The SAR is your Student Aid Letter. You will receive this by email within a week of filing the FAFSA. The SAR will explain your EFC (expected family contribution). This is the formula FAFSA calculates according to your cost of education. FAFSA will send this information to the prospective colleges and they will then prepare a financial aid award letter based on the data.

The Financial Aid Award Letter

This award letter will come from your college in early spring. The letter will summarize the aid the school is prepared to offer. Financial aid will be listed according to the type (scholarships, government grants and loans and out of pocket expense). The college will expect you to accept or decline these awards an return the letter.

Federal Aid Programs—

Federal programs are based on financial need. They are the largest single source of financial aid for college and come in the form of grants.

State Aid Programs—Most states support various aid programs (both need-based and merit). Generally, eligibility for state need-based programs follows the federal guidelines. This will be listed as a scholarship at the college (example -Board of Regents Scholarship)

Grants and Scholarships —

Awards based on merit or merit plus need. They don't have to be repaid.



Prom Dress clarifications presented

NOTE: The following information was discussed with the junior and senior girls.

Dear Parents:

At Aquinas Catholic High School we want to work with our parents to educate students on practicing the virtue of modesty, which we know is not easy in today's society, so we want to clarify acceptable dress styles as listed in the handbook. This isn't a change in the policy but a clarification of how the policy will be enforced. As the handbook states, "Prom is a FORMAL event. Girls may wear formal dresses. Nothing low-cut, or backless is permitted. Dress hemlines and/or slits must be a modest length below the fingertips, and midriffs may NOT be exposed. Girls need to have their shoulders covered for Mass." The following should be followed:

- *Dresses may be strapless (if they fit properly) or include spaghetti straps.
- *Dresses may be lower in the back, as long as they are not cut below a line drawn around from the naval.
- *2-piece dresses MUST overlap at the waist: meaning top MUST overlap with skirt waistband. Midriffs will not be exposed. This includes both front and side. With arms down at your side, if flesh touches flesh, the dress is inappropriate. Also, when arms are raised (such as in slow dancing) the midriff will not be exposed.
- *Dresses may not have a slit that exceeds mid-thigh. This is fingertip length.
- *Dresses may not be cut below the bust line.
- * Undergarments should not be visible. See-through apparel is not permitted.
- * Garments that are tight or low-cut are also unacceptable.
- * Side cuts would not be considered modest but could be altered by inserting fabric to cover the cut areas
- * Dress length must be mid-thigh (approximately 5" inches above the middle of the knee both in the front and the back).

Gentlemen, you are expected to wear formal attire. Formal prom attire may be classified as a tuxedo or dress suit, including a tie or bow tie, a dress shirt, which may include a vest or cummerbund, and dress shoes. Shirts are to be worn at all times. Tennis shoes and athletic shoes are unacceptable. If you are bringing a date from another school, they will have to comply to the same rules as our female students.

Even though in the past, dress attire that did not meet this criteria may have been admitted, this criteria will be adhered to beginning this year. We hope to maintain the integrity and formality of this night by enforcing this simple dress code. To ensure we don't have to turn students away due to violations, we will require girls to send photos of themselves wearing the dress ahead of time. The photos will need to show a full front, both sides, and back view. Also, a photo will be required of the girl with her arms raised to ensure no midriff is showing. Due to body types not being the same, approval will be on a case by case basis. Photos will be sent to Mrs. Pokorny and Mrs. Svec. If girls would rather bring their dress to school ahead of the Prom date and try it on for Mrs. Pokorny or Mrs. Svec, they may do so. A dress that doesn't meet the criteria may be easily altered by inserting fabric. We will work with girls, regardless of when they have their dress (even the day of the event) to ensure they can attend.

Junior and Senior girls will watch a presentation that will show acceptable and unacceptable dress choices. Another option for girls is to rent a dress from the Rent The Runway website: https://www.renttherunway.com




