Dear Aquinas Catholic Schools Families,

While I have been here for two years, as of June 20<sup>th</sup>, I will stepping into a new role at Aquinas as the new Chief Administrative Officer (CAO). These last two years I have taught eighth grade and freshmen theology. I have been the assistant golf coach and served on our technology committee. Moreover, I've participated in meetings from Board of Advisors, Finance Council, School Council Meetings and Foundation Board meetings and I feel ready to assume this role.

Additionally, this month, I will also be transitioning from pastor of Presentation Parish in Bellwood to being in residence at St. Mary Parish in David City. The title "in residence" means I am not in charge of anything at the parish; rather, I will live at the rectory as I serve as the CAO of Aquinas. However, I do plan on helping out at weekend Masses since close to 53% of our student population are from St. Mary's. I hope to also be of assistance to my brother priests in the Deanery to cover for them when they need. This will give me the opportunity to meet as many of our families as possible from the 13 parishes that support Aquinas.

A little bit about myself: I am from Cincinnati, Ohio, and am 38 years old. My parents are Joe Ventre and Patty Feucht. I am the only child of my parents, but I do have both half and step siblings. I have four sisters: Michaela, Lena, Maria and Holly and two brothers: Bryan and Kyle. I am also blessed with ten nieces and nephews. All my family still live in Ohio.

I attended St. Dominic Catholic School for elementary, and Delhi Junior High for seventh and eighth grade. I then attended St. Maximillian Kolbe High School and graduated in 2002. During my time at St. Max I was blessed to be taught by the Franciscan Friars of Mary Immaculate. These men not only taught me my Catholic faith but it was during these four years that my vocation began.

After I graduated in 2002, I made a trip to Lincoln with the Friars and visited the seminary in Seward. It really was a good fit for me. In March of 2003, I began classes at Southeast Community College and entered the seminary at St. Gregory in August of the same year. I graduated from St. Gregory's in 2007 with a B.A. in Philosophy and took some time off. I was actually out of the formation program for three years, and during that time I did Totus Tuus in Denver the summer of 2007, worked for the Diocese of Cheyenne (2007-2008) in their Education Office, served as their Coordinator of the Totus Tuus program, and MC'd for the Bishop during the confirmation season.

Finally, in 2010, I came back to Lincoln and attended St. Charles Borromeo Seminary for my theology studies and graduated in 2014 with a Masters in Divinity and M.A. in Sacred Scripture. I was ordained a priest for our diocese on May 24, 2014. My first assignment was St. Mary's Parish in Nebraska City from 2014-2017 as well as teaching sixth grade and seniors at Lourdes Central Catholic. In 2017, I was named pastor of St. Joseph Parish in Paul and St. Bernard's in Julian, while I continued to teach at Lourdes. At that time, I began my studies in Education Administration at the University of Mary in Bismarck, ND. In 2020, I completed my Master's degree and was named pastor of Presentation Parish in Bellwood and Assistant CAO at Aquinas Catholic Schools.

I truly do look forward to working with you all in the years to come. Additionally, I do want to thank Fr. Timmerman for his 14 years of service to this school. The field of education is a challenge as is running schools with over 100 staff members. During this time, there have been two additions and growth at Aquinas. Fr. Timmerman has done this with integrity and great character. He has also served this school as a man of faith. We wish him all the best in Plattsmouth.

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Art Day Camp organized and sponsored by the Butler County Arts Council returns to the Aquinas Art room this July with a choice of up to six different sessions with activities taught by excellent art instructors. There are two 2 hour sessions per day beginning on Wednesday, July 27<sup>th</sup> at 10 am with <u>Diane Noonan</u> teaching origami (the art of folding paper into shapes) to create unique works of art. That afternoon at 1 pm – <u>Addie Zook</u> leads how to draw cartoon portraits on shrinky-dink sheets to make your own keychain or charm. Thursday, July 28<sup>th at</sup> 10 am - <u>Sarah Juranek</u> teaches how to make a woven hoop wall hanging utilizing a hula hoop as a frame, material, yarn and beads. At 1 pm - <u>Addie Zook</u> will teach how to create colorful beads in polymer clay. The unique items created with these will be done after the beads are fired & cooled. Friday, July 29<sup>th</sup> at 10 am – <u>Gabrielle Comte</u> will introduce a simple screen printing method which uses easily found equipment and can be used on paper and fabrics to create multiples of a design. 1 pm - <u>Diane Noonan</u> will lead creation of pop-up cards which delight people of all ages.

**<u>Sarah Juranek</u>** who is a recent graduate of the studio art program at UNK returning for her 5<sup>th</sup> year of summer teaching for this program.

**Diane Noonan** is a new art day camp instructor but an experienced art teacher from David City H. S., a member of Columbus Area artists for over 20 years & board member for Association of Nebraska Art Clubs.

<u>Gabrielle Comte</u> is a returning art instructor and UNL grad in Visual Arts employed full time by Bone Creek Art Museum.

<u>Addie Zook</u> is a gifted artist & graduate of Aquinas who taught art day camp last year and is now a graphic design major at Benedictine College.



3. Follow the progress tracker and continue until you get to the Thank You page




Make drop-off and pick-up easier. Parents, you only need to do ONE drop off and ONE pick-up.

You need to have your photographer email your colored formal pose picture in a vertical billfold sized JPEG file at 250 dpi to me for the yearbook, composite, alumni board, press releases, and class video. This picture should be the colored formal indoor pose with a plain background. (This should be a head shot with no hands or lower arms visible please.) You are responsible for making sure the school has this by November 1st. They may email this to Mrs. Pokorny at teresa-pokorny@cdolinc.net

If we do not have your print by November 1st, you may miss out on being in the composite, yearbook, etc. or have to pay for the late fee to be included. Be sure to schedule your pictures to be taken by September 1<sup>st</sup>.

As we at Aquinas should always strive to live up to Christ's example of modesty and Christian decency, we ask that no inappropriate pictures be submitted for publication. This would include:

- 1. Females-no off-the-shoulder dresses or blouses
- Females-no tops with an immodest/low cut (cut of the top must be 1 inch above the line of cleavage); no spaghetti or thin straps on shoulders for dresses or blouses
- 3. Males-wear a collared shirt and tie. (A jacket is preferred but optional.)

#### How to Help Your Child Make Good Choices

Students making choices is always difficult, not only for the students but also for the adults in their lives who want what is best for them. It is especially hard when students don't want to talk about those choices with adults, or they think they "know best". It is hard for adults to sit by and let students make mistakes that they will learn from, even though the adult knows or can accurately predict how their choice will play out. Students do not always value the life experiences an adult has had because they think "it's different now than it was when you were a kid". So, what can you, as the caring adult, do to not only open that communication with your student, but also have your input heard and valued and hopefully influence them for the better?

One big barrier youth face when it comes to making decisions is their impulsivity. They may feel excited, anxious, upset, etc. when they think about a choice and its outcomes which can cause them to make rash decisions. The part of the brain that controls decision making skills is still developing in your student. Encouraging your student to stop and take some time to think about everything before making a decision will help them make more appropriate decisions. Help them see that they are making an impulsive decision when they make decisions too quickly and that they are making decisions based on emotions rather than rational thoughts.

There are five steps your student should go through when making a decision. The first step is to identify the decision. This is looking at how the student feels in the moment. Are they making an impulsive decision or do they need to take some time to think about their decision? You can do this by asking three questions: What feelings are you having right now? What is the strongest emotion you are feeling? and When did you notice you were feeling this way? Taking a step back and taking some time will help them gain a better understanding of the problem they are trying to solve, what they want to accomplish and what the best possible outcome would be.


Step Two is helping the student understand their options. This can be done in many ways, like simply talking through the decision and the options that the student faces. The best way to encourage a student to come to you when they have a hard decision is to make sure there is open communication. Create a no judgment zone so that the student feels like their opinions and wants/needs are valued. Do not lecture them or come into the conversation with a "know it all" attitude. Guide the decision but do not make the decision for your student.

The Third Step is to make the decision. Some questions you could ask to help your student make a decision are: Will it help you achieve your goal? Is it honest? Will it create a problem for someone else? and Is it safe? It is very important to help your student understand that with every decision comes a responsibility they will have as a result of that decision. Help guide the student to see if they are ready for that responsibility and help them decide for themselves if they think they can handle the outcome. Then if your student handles the responsibility in a good way, praise them. Help them see what they did well and it will encourage them to continue making good choices. Try not to intervene unless they or someone else is in danger. Let your student make little mistakes that they can learn from.

The next step is acting on the decision. This includes following through on the decision that the student has decided to make. Make sure that your student knows that no matter what the outcome is, you will be there to support and help them. Cultivate your relationship by talking with them and checking that they are ok after the fact. This will help the student feel like if something goes wrong, they can come to you for help. Or maybe they will be excited with how well the decision is going and want to share their experience with you. If that is the case, praise them for making good decisions to reinforce that behavior.

The last step is to reflect on the decision with the student. Help the student think through their decision-making process in order to see if there was anything they could do better in the future. Some questions to ask are: What did I learn about myself? What's important to me? What was hard about what I did? What was easy about what I did? The next time I have to make a decision, what would I do the same? and What might I do differently next time?

Decision-making skills are hard for youth to learn on their own because they may not make decisions by actually thinking about them but rather make decisions based on emotions. Taking these steps and helping students develop their skills while they are young will help them be able to make good decisions as adults. Their brains are still forming and they are learning these skills either on their own or with the guidance of caring adults. This is one skill that they will need to become a self-functioning adult who makes good decisions for the long-term.
